JEROME EDWARD DUCKLER

Jerry passed away on May 29, 2014, at age 77.

I've known Jerry for more than 20 years and kept in contact with him even after I moved to Atlanta 14 years ago. We'd talk on the phone a couple times a month, usually about the stock market, health issues, and other things, but ALWAYS about bridge.

He was a good mentor to me and to others. Jerry told me more than once that if he was offered several million dollars on the condition he'd have to give up playing bridge, there was no way he'd take the money. And there's no question that he definitely meant that!

I don't know much about a lot of things, but I'm sure of this: no one loved playing bridge more than Jerry.

I played bridge with Jerry twice a week for about six years. He loved the game and was happy to share his knowledge with any who seemed interested. I really miss playing bridge with him.

I first met Jerry about 52 years ago shortly after he graduated from UW Law School. In 1964 we were both members of the Young Adult Club at the Jewish Center, and Phil Bellack was another member of the club. Phil asked the group if any one wanted to learn how to play bridge, and Jerry and I became part of that class.

After taking lessons for several months, Phil told us about something called "duplicate bridge" and that there was a game for beginners at a place on 35th and North Avenue. That is where Jerry and I became bridge addicts. We played five or six times and week and started playing in the open game shortly thereafter.

I married in 1969, and Jerry married a bridge player, Glenna Ware, a few years later, so we cut back on our bridge partnership. After Jerry and Glenna divorced, I introduced him to another bridge player, Julie Simpson. And, by golly, he married her.

About that time I wrote a bridge book about a strong club system, and Jerry was my first (victim) partner who played it with me. My "book" was written in longhand and was not very well organized. With Julie's encouragement, I organize it better and she then type up a 55-page manuscript. Jerry and I played that system for over 30 years.

One measure of the talent of a bridge player is how many masterpoints they have accumulated. Jerry had over 5,000, and by my estimate he was among the top 20 "winningest" players in the State of Wisconsin.

Although Jerry was a perfectionist and could be somewhat demanding, he was not mean or excessively critical. He just wanted to have his partners improve their game.
